

Messiah Lutheran Church Annual Meeting Minutes January 28, 2018

Call to Order by President Jonathan Kniss at I0:57 a.m. Quorum was established with 104 signed in.

Opening Prayer: Pastor Eric Wooldridge led the congregation in an opening prayer.

Agenda

Adoption of Agenda. Motion to approve the agenda for January 28, 2018. L. Inman / C. Radabaugh. Motion carried.

Approval of Minutes. Motion to approve the January 29, 2017 minutes. Benjamin I L. Powers. Motion carried.

New Business

- Nominations.
 - Council, 3 Year Terms. The Nominating Committee brought forward four names for three three-year term vacancies on council (Jaymie Baunach, Nick Brinkmeyer, Dave Carlsen, and Wayne Gilthvedt.) Nominations were solicited from the floor. No additional nominations were made.
 - Council, 1 Year Term. The Nominating Committee brought forward one name for a one-year, unfulfilled position on council (Alan Melrose.)
 Nominations were solicited from the floor. No additional nominations were made.
 - Endowment Committee. The Nominating Committee brought forward two
 names for two three-year term vacancies on the Endowment Committee (Mary
 Berglund and Ross Chamberlain.) Nominations were solicited from the floor. No
 additional nominations were made.
 - Synod Assembly. There is not a synod assembly in 2018 so no nominations were made.
 - o **2018 Nominating Committee**. The Nominating Committee brought forward three names for a one-year position on the 2018 Nominating Committee (Barry Brenan, Paul Decker, and Sheilia McLaughlin.) Nominations were solicited from the floor. No additional nominations were made.
 - Ballots were distributed, collected, and counted by Lori Johnson, Charlie Radabaugh, and Alex Littlefield.
- Proposed Budget for 2018. Treasurer Ross Chamberlain reviewed the proposed budget for 2018 that was put together by the Finance Committee (Ross Chamberlain, Chuck Carlson, Duane Gatzke, Bev Melrose, Pastor Eric Wooldridge, and Pastor Chuck Harris.)

Assistance was provided by church staff members: Lynne Inman, Pam Downing, and Mary Berglund. Highlights of the presentation included:

- O The budget is balanced this year with no congregational challenge.
- o Income was below budget for 2017 as were expenses.
- Rental income was significantly over budget and has helped us in balancing the budget moving forward. The biggest jump in rental income was the addition of the Seventh Day Adventist Congregation worshiping in our building and the Auburn School District ECEAP Preschool that is now renting classroom space.
- o Income for 2018 is projected to be \$824,840. This comes from 123 pledges and estimates of unpledged giving.
- O Expenses for 2018 are budgeted to be \$824,840. This is 5% less than the 2017 budget.

Several questions were asked and comments made:

- O Questions were asked about what it would take to keep our rostered staff at synod guidelines. The synod guidelines have increased substantially for 2018 to better represent the cost of living in the Pacific Northwest. It would take around \$35,000 to be able to meet synod guidelines.
- o It was suggested that pledge cards be moved online for 2019.
- o It was suggested that members go home and consider increasing their pledge to meet unfunded request in the budget.
- o It was asked whether there would be an opportunity for staff salary adjustments or bonuses later in the year if income was ahead of projections.

Old Business

• There was no old business.

Receive Reports: President Kniss provided the opportunity for committees to add to their written reports.

- Endowment Committee: Homer Wood reported that this was the 25th year for the endowment which has grown to a corpus of \$550,000 (market value) and will distribute \$19,000 in 2019. Last year, the council was asked to prioritize needs for the Endowment Committee to consider and organ repairs was the top priority. On April 15, the Endowment Committee will sponsor an Evening with the METT which will include an evening educational seminar and catered meal for more to learn about opportunities through the endowment.
- Messiah Video: A photo montage of various ministries was shared.
- Election Results:
 - o Council, 3 Year Terms: Jaymie Baunach, Nick Brinkmeyer, and Dave Carlsen
 - o Council, 1 Year Term: Alan Melrose
 - Endowment Committee: Mary Berglund and Ross Chamberlain
 - o Nominating Committee: Barry Brenan, Paul Decker, and Sheilia McLaughlin

For the Good of Messiah:

- Jonathan Kniss acknowledged the outstanding work of the staff and volunteers.
- Alan Melrose recognized the Finance Committee for all their hard work.
- Ruthanne Henderson shared her love for the congregation's verse (Micah 6:8) as it was her confirmation verse. She reminded us that one of the ways that we can live into this verse is becoming familiar with the social statements and social messages that are on the ELCA website.
- Jamie Henderson reminded the congregation that God's Work Our Hands will be happening on September 9, 2018. There will be a global emphasis this year.
- Adriana Chandler shared that the quilters sent 500 school kits to Lutheran World Relief this year. They were part of the 305,000 quilts and 215,000 school kits that were distributed around the world. She highlighted the Pie Sale happening on February 11 that helps cover shipping costs for school kits and quilts. It was noted that one of Adriana's quilts made the Lutheran World Relief poster. Lisa Powers shared a story of one of her MBA students at Saint Martin's University who was a lost boy of Sudan that remembers receiving a school kit as a child and what a huge difference that made in his life.
- Kelly Mullin shared that the Buy One Give One hot chocolate sale to kick off Mission Sunday raised \$107 and thanked the congregation for their support.

Pastors' Remarks:

- Pastor Eric reflected that he'd had a very symmetrical time at MLC: two years with Pastor Greg, two years in transition, and now two years with Pastor Chuck. He talked about this time being the best with a clear vision and mission as we learn to live into Micah 6:8. He shared his excitement about strategic partnerships especially with the Auburn School District ECEAP program.
- Pastor Chuck shared that his word that describes this time is gratitude. He reflected on the
 memorial service that had happened for Svava Sigmar and the remembering that Pastor
 Eric & Svava Sigmar were not about sitting around and doing the same thing -but rather
 helping MLC to move forward. He asked that the congregation keep one another and the
 congregation in prayer as we continue to meet the changing needs of the Auburn
 community.

Adjournment: A motion was made to adjourn the annual meeting. N. Kirkpatrick/ A. Littlefield. Motion carried. The meeting was adjourned at 12: 17 p.m.

Closing Prayer: Pastor Chuck Harris led the congregation in a closing prayer.

The group adjourned to a lasagna lunch prepared by Sheilia McLaughlin.

Anne Baunach Council Member Dear Messiah Lutheran Church congregation,

As my Council term draws to a close, I'd like to provide you with some perspective.

First of all, as a Council, I believe our greatest responsibility is to take care of things such that we provide you with a great place to exercise your faith and worship together.

A few years ago, we engaged the congregation in a comprehensive survey. The Council, along with a separate team of people, turned that information into a Mission Portfolio. Although it was a big step forward to have a stated Mission Portfolio, it really is only words, unless it is put into action. Over the last year, your Council has spent a great deal of time defining our Mission Portfolio in further detail and creating a Strategic Plan from it. Now we have a well-defined Mission Portfolio, with goals, timelines, responsibilities, and measures. All of this has been serving as a lens that we've been using to assess priorities, determine staff job descriptions, and prepare a budget. We intend to share our work with you at our Annual Meeting.

Speaking of the budget, we finished last year with a surplus! For this year's budget, we finally have an opportunity to provide our great staff with pay increases, which brings their compensation closer to synod-recommended levels.

I'm happy to report that our Council members generally like each other. In part through retreats, we've gotten to know each other such that when we disagree, we have constructive debates. Many of us recall being on Council when that was not the case! In addition, this Council has good harmony with the Staff. We've intentionally held retreats with both Council and Staff present.

My greatest gratitude goes to our army of volunteers, which are the heart and soul of this Church. Many are visible however, many are not. Many are thanked however, many are not. The need is great. We intend to do a better job in the future identifying volunteer needs, recruiting needed volunteers, and recognizing our volunteers.

Our work is never done, and I look forward to your support of the Council as it continues its work.

The purpose of the Associate Director of Faith Formation and Partnerships is to help the congregation of Messiah Lutheran Church live into its mission of doing justice, loving mercy, and walking humbly.

Ministry Position Summary

The faith community of Messiah Lutheran Church is seeking an Associate Director to help the congregation develop lively growth in faith and foster both internal and external partnerships that serve the greater Auburn community. This full-time position is designed to work in conjunction with church staff and congregation members and friends to 1) nurture growth in faith for our youngest children through youth in 6th grade and their families and 2) build both internal and external partnerships that allow the congregation to accompany those in need. Specifically, this person will help the congregation with three of its mission priorities:

As we fully share who we are with one another, through respectful conversation and kind action, we envision a community alive with the desire to know and follow Jesus. - Cultivate an appreciation and desire for children and youth to participate in the ministry of the whole church.
- In conjunction with the Director of Faith Formation, prepare and manage the budget for Passionate Spirituality.
- Provide support for the Community Meal each week. In conjunction with the meal, build relationships and trust with our meal guests, Messiah congregants, and the wider Auburn community. Help identify, orient, and support new volunteers, from both inside and outside the congregation, to become engaged with, and passionate for, this opportunity to minister with others.
- Identify and facilitate complimentary programs to take place during the time of the Community Meal.
- Promote a congregational culture of accompaniment with the wider community. Nurture,

The Minister of Caring and Adult Faith Formation at Messiah Lutheran Church will facilitate a comprehensive Caring Ministry Program and provide pastoral care for those church members and friends unable to participate in the regular activities of church life. The individual will also work on creating Adult Faith Formation and Vocational Reflection opportunities across a variety of existing and potential ministry platforms. Finally, the individual will assist, on a periodic basis, with preaching and leading worship, both for regular Sunday services and other special services as the need may arise.

Ministry Responsibilities and Duties

- Assess the care needs of congregation members and friends and work to develop and support a
 plan of care across a network of individuals to meet the identified care needs. Provide ongoing
 evaluation and adjust the care network plan and response as needs either increase or decrease.
- With Care Team input, maintain and update a database of those who are shut-in, hospitalized, or otherwise unable to participate in church activities on a regular basis, along with suggested levels of caring ministry to be provided. Provide Senior Pastor with care need priorities upon which follow-up is needed.

 Maintain and execute an ongoing pastoral visitation schedule with those unable to participate in the regular activities of church life. Determine, in consultation with the Care Team and Sr.
 Pastor, the appropriate frequency of pastoral visits with these individuals.

- Coordinate pastoral visitation with Care Team participants who are providing ongoing visits for those unable to regularly participate in church activities.
- In consultation with the Sr. Pastor, work with families grieving the loss of a loved one and shepherd them through the cycles of loss. Be prepared to provide follow-up pastoral care as indicated or requested by families.
- In coordination with the Sr. Pastor, plan, facilitate and/or lead memorial, funeral, and/or graveside services for congregation members and friends as requested by family.
- On a schedule to be determined with the Sr. Pastor, be available for and respond to requests for emergency pastoral care.
- Partner with the Director of Faith Formation and the Associate Director of Faith Formation to create, implement, and nurture a seamless faith formation program built on the pillars of Leadership Development, Fellowship, Faith Formation, and Service.
- Teach in the adult forum and schedule other instructors and speakers on a regular basis. See that a variety of biblical, theological, historical, ethical, and practical topics are covered. Lead other faith forming experiences and classes as appropriate.
- Guide and equip Messiah's already existing small group ministry. Nurture small group leaders and assist them in choosing material appropriate for their small groups.
- Participate in the FaithWalk Ministry, first as a participant, second as a guide, and then as a coordinator. With the Sr. Pastor, help shape the FaithWalk ministry as the primary entrance into Messiah life and growth in faith.
- Communicate the FaithWalk process to the congregation as an opportunity for members and friends to be mentors in faith for their families, friends, and/or neighbors.
- Participate in Messiah's weekly staff meeting, the monthly Care Team Ministry meeting, and other meetings with staff or teams as necessary.

Job Skills and Requirements

- Applicant may be either a Lay Minister or Rostered Clergy. Emphasis is on strong and articulate journey of faith and commitment to ELCA biblical, theological, and social stances.
- Background or emphasis in pastoral care ministry, faith formation, and vocational guidance is required.
- Proficiency in computer skills including utilization of Microsoft Office 365, Church Windows, and Google Docs.
- A commitment to good interpersonal and communication skills, teamwork, and support of church ministries.
- A commitment to confidentiality regarding all conversations and records, including, but not limited to, the church, church staff, and church members and friends.

Hours and Compensation

- The position is available 01/15/2019; start date is negotiable.
- We have budgeted based on 28 hours per week. Weekly hours are flexible, with some weeks being under 28 hours a week and some weeks over 28 hours, based on personal schedule and workload demand in the congregation. Compensation is determined through the congregation's

 account will be provided. Amount is determined annually through the congregation's budget
 process and approved at the congregation's annual meeting.

When I think about the last year at Messiah I am filled with gratefulness for the people of Messiah. Just last Sunday we heard the gospel reading from Luke where Jesus and his family travel to Jerusalem for the Festival of the Passover and when it is time to leave, they discover that he has not been traveling home with them. After what I imagine must be a horrific three days, they find Jesus in the temple, listening and asking questions. I love this text because we get a little glimpse of what Jesus' life was like before his ministry began and what life for Mary and Joseph must have been like raising the Son of God.

I also love the picture this text paints- the family traveling together, not just Mary and Joseph and Jesus, but relatives and friends as well, following the custom of their family to worship together at the Festival of the Passover. This was an event for the whole family, people of all ages were gathered together in worship and sacrifice. And then as a large family unit they travel home again. (This makes me think of traveling to camp or the National Youth Gathering...matching shirts is best!) While Mary and Joseph are frantically looking for Jesus, he is right where he believes he needs to be- in his Father's house. People traveled far and wide to gather at the temple for two reasons: 1. to make a sacrifice and 2. to encounter God. We gather in churches still today to encounter God. To hear the Good News, to be filled with the Holy Spirit and to hear about the ultimate sacrifice that Christ made for us. And we do it as a family. Mothers, fathers, step-parents, grandparents, sons, daughters and sisters and brothers in Christ of all ages gather together to worship our God. The family of Messiah is an amazing group that empowers, encourages and supports one another in our journey of faith. I am so grateful for all of you who came alongside me as we continued this faithful journey of Faith Formation at Messiah. None of the work I did would have been possible without Sunday School teachers, helpers, music leaders, chaperones and most importantly a supportive congregation that saw children as a vital part of our church family.

The text from Luke also makes me think of the Faith Formation journey of Jesus- he wasn't on this journey alone. His parents brought him. For most children, their first experience with faith doesn't happen in the church, it happens at home. At home parents and grandparents and siblings and extended family have an opportunity to model faith. Grace, forgiveness, love and sacrifice are learned at home through everyday life. As we read God's word and pray and encourage faithful conversations, we are teaching our children all about the love of God. I am so thankful for all of the parents and guardians who brought their children to Messiah for Sunday School, Explorers and VBS. I am grateful for the opportunity to walk alongside you as you raise your child in the house of God.

Jesus sat in the temple listening and asking questions. I've learned so much from the way that children listen, play, explore and ask questions about faith. I was honored to be part of that discovery and wonderment of faith. Children of Messiah- I miss you all very much and I think of you often! Know that you are still in my prayers everyday and just as Paul writes, "My prayer is that light will flood your heart and that you will understand the hope that was given when God chose you." Messiah Lutheran Christmas Hamper Project

The 57th annual Messiah Lutheran Hamper project was a big success. Every year this project takes a huge commitment by our entire church family and sometimes it becomes routine. Its nice to be reminded of why we do this. This year one of the recipients helped us remember. She came in, somewhat tentatively, checked in and was directed to the clothing and toy room, while we pulled her hamper. We loaded her car and she thanked the volunteers. Thirty minutes later she came back with flowers for the volunteers with her head held high. She wanted to say thank you and to make sure we understand the difference we made in her family, and all the others that we helped. She said that without us her family would not have had a Christmas, and we had no idea how much of a difference this had made to her family, and so many others. We all cried, hugged and said Merry Christmas and God Bless.

Now on to the details. This year we worked with four different agencies to sponsor 55 families. They were as follows: Pregnancy Aid, Auburn School District, Children's Home Society, and SHAG (Senior Housing). In addition, we sponsored families from our own congregation. The one change in these agencies was the loss of the Domestic Violence organization. In prior years we had sponsored 60 families, but we had not hung tags on the trees for the Domestic Violence families and we were concerned with being able to support adding five additional families with gifts (approximately 20 more tags).

On our Christmas tree that hung in the gathering space we had 233 tags for family members. All tags were taken by our church family, and friends, and in addition we had 9 new bikes that were donated for those families that are not on our list but that come into look at our slightly used area. Estimated in-kind donation was ~\$9,500.

Volunteer help was ok for the first few days. To set up tables we had a small crew of about 10 individuals. On Thursday, when we purchased the food, we had around 20 volunteers. On Friday as we got gifts ready, we had a crew of between 5-10 people that rotated through. The day of hampers we were short of volunteers! At the starting time of hampers, we did not have enough hands to push all of our carts to the food and packages for our families. We had one father from one of the families we were sponsoring that jumped in and helped us for a couple of hours! Next year we will make sure to stress the importance of volunteers on this day, and perhaps work with youth programs to get some family volunteers. We are not seeing the families that we used to see in our early years of participating in this program. To make the day extra special Tia Monsen brought her piano students in to perform Christmas music as families picked up their food and packages.

Cash donations this year were down from last year, but we had plenty of Turkeys and Hams. We started the year with \$1,337 that we had carried over from last year. We received donations of \$4,041 and spent \$4,820. This was down \$400 from the amount spent in 2017. This leaves a balance for next year of \$558.

Lastly, as always, we met many very thankful people on the day of hampers in addition to the families mentioned above. Thanks to all of you that volunteered, purchased a gift, or donated cash. You all made a difference. It is an honor to continue this tradition at Messiah.

In 2013 Don and Judy Jensen took over from the Ramberg's to help the Messecar's. Thanks, from all of us to the Ramberg's for being so dedicated to Messiah's seniors.

God's Work. Our Hands. 2018

Messiah Lutheran participated in the annual God's Work. Our Hands. event on Sunday, September 9th.

The focus this year was on the experience of refugees and immigrants. We partnered with World Relief Seattle, a local nonprofit which has worked alongside refugees and immigrants since 1979. Welcoming, supporting, and creating the possibility to thrive is what World Relief does for newcomers to the United States.

This is the list of activities from GWOH!

- 1. **Loss Simulation**. A volunteer from World Relief ran the simulation and gave participants the opportunity to explore what refugees and immigrants give up as they leave their homelands.
- 2. A group had an opportunity to go to the **World Relief Garden** in Kent and participate in garden work alongside folks who have immigrated to this area. They were taught about foods and customs of those who are new to the US and who are making their way into a new life.
- 3. World Relief had a staffed **Information Table** with a host available to talk about the organization and ongoing opportunities to work alongside refugees and immigrants in the Puget Sound area.
- 4. Messiah had a table for **Writing Cards** of support for refugees and immigrants and **Letters to Elected Officials or Editors** on a topic related to immigration and the experience of refugees.
- 5. What do you need when you are new to an area and have nothing? We built **Welcome Kits** stuffed with **Welcome Notes** to be given to newcomers as they settle into their new life here as our neighbors.
- 6. A **Movie and Discussion** regarding the movie "Are You Listening" and a guided discussion around issues of refugees and immigrants.
- 7. We created a **Refugee Simulation**, based on ELCA and Jesuit resources and combined it with **Prayer Stations** for reflection on the experience of refugees and immigrants.

Messiah Quilters Report 2018

Messiah Quilters made and shipped a total of 263 quilts to Lutheran World Relief. We also assembled and shipped 313 school kits, 117 Baby care kits, 228 Personal care kits, 14 Fabric kits. With this we spent \$1030.00 to cover shipping costs from Seattle to Baltimore, and worldwide.

We had a pie sale in February, earning \$836.00. This was used to help with LWR shipping costs.

During the summer we had many donations, both of school supplies and money to help with sending 313 school kits.

The Bazaar quilters table and bake sale had a combined income of \$1162.00.

In January, we bought 5 rolls of batting, and in December, 10 more rolls for a combined cost of \$1743.30.

Besides the batting (which we need to make as many quilts as we do) we bought material for quilts, sewing thread, diaper material, baby clothes, soap, hand towels, and bath towels, school supplies, and other miscellaneous needs for our mission.

We thank ALL who support us in whatever way (sewing, donations, making pies, etc.). We cannot do what we do without the support of the whole congregation!

Messiah Lutheran Church Endowment Fund Committee Report for 2018 Messiah Endowing Today for Tomorrow

Your Endowment fund beginning balance for 2018 was \$548,874.42. Of the \$19,638.32 available for donations in 2018, \$16,229.84 was donated as indicated below. The ending balance of 2018, including interest, dividend and appreciation, was \$512,234.18. The return on investment for the year with dividends, capital gains, appreciation and additions was -3.7%.

Donations to MLC Endowment Fund from 1993 amount to \$334,230.87 through December 31, 2018. During that same time, the Endowment Fund has distributed over \$149,000! The MLC Endowment funds are invested in six Vanguard funds, and a Business Checking Account at Columbia Bank.

In order to sustain the endowment fund 'forever', we have available to spend each year roughly 4% of the total value of the endowment fund, just like is done for retirement spending. The total value of the endowment fund figure is based on a 5-year average. The committee also considers inflation, dividend growth and yearly performance of the funds when establishing the funds available for distribution, which insures funds are available for perpetuity and that none of the principal will ever be at risk. The 4% figure is not fixed, but cannot exceed 6% nor go lower than 3%. For 2019, the four percent of the average value of the last five years is \$20,167.08. The endowment committee will determine the exact amount available for distribution in 2019 at their first meeting of the year.

Forms are available in the office to request funds to support religious and social service needs other than normal operating expenses.

MLC Endowment Committee approved six distributions in 2018. There was \$1,364.00 in scholarships donated for Flathead leadership training, and \$14,865.84 donated to various missions, both within and outside of Messiah Lutheran. The missions within Messiah included upgrades to the church organ, Endowment dinner, YAGM mission, Youth gathering, and Pastor Eric Woolridge Farm of the Child mission.

Homer Wood and Judy Bishop have completed their three-year terms. Thanks for their support. Nominees to the three-year position to the MLC Endowment Committee will be voted on during the annual congregational meeting.

Homer Wood MLC Endowment Fund Committee Chairman Dale Schossow MLC Endowment Fund Financial Secretary Audit Committee Report for Fiscal Year 2017

This report recaps the audit process and results of the audit for the financial records of the Messiah Lutheran Church and its related organizations to the Congregation Council for the period beginning January 1, 2017 and ending December 31, 2017.

The committee believes the financial records reviewed fairly reflected the financial position of the accounts of Messiah Lutheran Church as of December 31, 2017.

The review consisted of examining bank statements, credit card statements, payroll, accounts payable, and cash handling procedures. No material irregularities were noted during the tests and no correcting entries were necessary. Minutes from Council meetings were reviewed as well as written policies and procedures. Additionally, recommendations from the previous audit were reviewed by the audit committee and noted that progress has been made to on several.

Finance Committee Report

2018

The Finance Committee met monthly working with the Treasurer (Nick Brinkmeyer) and Financial Coordinator (Mary Berglund) to analyze financial reports and strategize how best to utilize our financial resources to serve the ministries of Messiah.

The finance committee developed the 2019 budget that was presented to and approved by Council on December 20, 2018. A narrative of the budget follows:

Income: General undesignated income was calculated from pledges received. The number of pledge cards received was down 9% from last year. Automatic giving at Messiah with Thrivent "Simply Giving" or VANCO "Online Giving" remain the stalwarts for maintaining a regular cash flow throughout the year. Those who are not participating in an automatic giving program are encouraged to do so. For those who had not pledged, a forecast based on 2018 actual giving was made. Other incomes (special offerings, and anonymous giving) were valued at 2018 actual values with anticipated values. 2019 projected rental income has increased and was based on known tenants/leases. 2018 also provided a surplus which will be applied to the general fund reserve. After an initial analysis of projected income, in December an effort was made to contact all members who had pledged and/or used automatic giving in 2018 but had not turned in pledge cards for 2019. Thank you to all who participated in that effort.

Expenses: The budget is grouped in areas of Messiah's ministries reflecting the Messiah Mission and Vision statements. Within these areas are specific line items. Since actual expenses for 2018 were well under budgeted expenses this year, the finance committee decided to use 2018 actual expenses as the basis for many of the 2019 budget expenses. This provided the means to more closely balance projected income against expenses, however it does have the risk that any unforeseen expense could potentially eat into our reserves. The finance committee also provided budget estimates to the Council for options for 0%, 2.5%, 5% and 9% staff raises. Opportunities to obtain funding via Endowment and Memorials funds were maximized as appropriate per our Constitution and other options to reduce expenses such as not funding the parking lot pavement reserve were explored. Monthly budget variances will be provided to the ministry teams and reviewed at each Council meeting in 2019.

<u>Summary</u>: Messiah's income is largely contingent on the congregation fulfilling pledging commitments. An exhaustive analysis was made to ascertain income projections. The Council elected to approve the 2019 budget which includes a 9% staff raise option. With the extra effort in December to contact members who had not turned in pledge cards, we anticipate having a balanced budget for 2019 without using any reserve funds.
