Annual Meeting Minutes February 5, 2023

Opening Prayer: Pastor Chuck opened the meeting in prayer.

Call To Order: Council President Anne Baunach called the meeting to order at 10:55 with a quorum of 61 confirmed members.

Adoption of Agenda: The agenda was presented in the Annual Report and on screen. Motion to approve the agenda as presented. (Lynne Inman/Charlie Radabaugh). Motion passed.

Adoption of Minutes: The minutes were presented in the Annual Report. Motion to approve the January 30, 2022 Annual Meeting Minutes as presented. (Katie Walda/Mary Lou Macarius). Motion passed.

New Business:

Nominations for Church Council: There are four council members whose terms expired or need to step away from council: Charlie Radabaugh, Dave Foss, Dan Fergueson, and Anne Baunach. Anne Baunach and Shannon Spicciati have agreed to run for council. There are still two spots to fill. Nominations for council from the floor: Pastor Susan Kirlin-Hackett nominated herself and Ernest Thomas nominated himself. Motion to accept the ballot as present and elect the candidates by acclimation. (Josh Luebke/Lynne Inman). Motion passed.

Constitutional Changes: Josh Luebke presented the constitutional changes which were also presented in the Annual Report. The changes bring Messiah's constitution in line with the ELCA and SW Washington Synod's model constitution. Motion to approve the proposed changes to the Messiah Lutheran Church's constitution. (Jonathan Baunach/Mary Lou Macarius). Motion passed

Financial Report & Proposed Budget: Council Treasurer Janene Nelson presented the year-end financial report for 2022. Last year's budget included putting aside a reserve of \$38,533 from the general fund reserve balance to balance the budget. However, the actual difference between income and expenses for 2022 was - \$31,729 so \$7,254 is going back into the general fund reserve. Janene then presented the 2023 budget and was also provided in the Annual Report. There is currently a difference in the budget of -\$54,932. The budget includes setting aside \$54,932 in the general fund reserve to cover that difference, if it is needed. Motion to approve the 2023 budget for Messiah Lutheran Church as presented. (Alan Melrose/Ross Chamberlain). Motion passed.

Old Business: No old business was discussed.

Election Results: As Council Ballot was approved by acclimation, balloted election results were not needed.

For the Good of Messiah:

- Adriana Chandler shared thanks for everyone in the congregation who has supported the quilters. The quilters sent over 500 school kits and sent quilts to Ukraine and Poland through Lutheran World Relief.
- Elisa Holman shared thanks for the Bombas socks distribution through Messiah Lutheran Church.
- Thanks was shared to Charlie and the Gathering Space redesign committee for all of their hard work.
- Pastor Chuck shared that, through the work of Charlie and Tia, the carpet in Galli Hall will be replaced soon
- Pastor Chuck also shared thanks for Charlie for the redesign of Sigmar Chapel

- Charlie Radabaugh shared the plan for the 100th anniversary celebration. There will be a meeting towards the end of February. If you are interested in being a part of the celebration, reach out to Charlie or attend the meeting.
- Jan shared thanks for all who supported the Tech Team with all of the changes that came with the livestreaming.

Adjournment: Motion to adjourn the meeting. (Shelia McLaughlin/Lauren Mendez). Motion passed.

And to God alone be all glory -



The task of the Care Team is to maintain contact with MLC members who may or may not be able to attend worship services. Contact includes phone calls, cards, and visits. Additionally, that Care Team informs Pastor Susan of the status of members. The Team meets monthly. MLC members not on the Care Team are encouraged to inform Pastor Susan of pastoral care needs that she can address. This ministry is congregation-wide! It takes a village to care for each other.

In 2023 the following was accomplished:

The communion kits were refurbished with a new version of a communion liturgy. The kits are available to Care Team members who provide in-home communion.

The Care Team proposed a Cooling Center to Council for approval. The proposal was to make the Youth Room available to MLC members during hot summer days. A list of protocols was developed, which were approved by Council and posted. The room was not utilized in 2023, so the Care Team revisited the protocols and changed the hours of availability, which, hopefully will make the effort more attractive to those seeking a cool place to escape the heat.

For the second year, a Senior VBS was offered the end of June. It is growing in popularity! What became clear was that many folks particularly enjoyed having dinner together. Following up, the Care Team developed a proposal for the Finance Team to offer a monthly meal, fellowship, and Bible study. The meal would be lunch during the NW dark months and dinner as NW days grow longer It will be a new line item included in the 2024 budget ~ a modest amount that will make the meal free/affordable. And, there will be a Senior VBS again in summer of 2024! There is an old song lyric, "The more we get together, the happier we'll be!" Research is clear: Loneliness is epidemic. Care Team hopes to minster to and with those who are lonely.

The Senior newsletter was sent to MLC members each month with the exception of August. The intent is that MLC members who do not have computer availability and/or skills would receive information regarding our life together. The Care Team discussed at length the issue that folks who can get the twice-weekly MLC update would not receive the paper newsletter. Additionally, the newsletter is available in the online update. So, those who have computer availability and/or skills \sim just print a copy for yourself \sim a BIG thank you for those who do so. . . Thanks, too, to Judy Ruud, Pastor Chuck, Pastor Bridget for your wonderful articles! Thanks to Mary and Bill Bush who have provided the copies, envelopes and postage for the last 3 years! Cheers!

Finance Committee Report for 2023

We started off the year with a general fund reserve of \$115,520.05 which included \$54,932 that we set aside to cover the planned budget deficit for 2023 which was approved by the congregation at our annual meeting in Feb. 2023. Giving and income started out slow the first three months through March, but bounced back in April and May. Giving and income were down for June, Aug., Oct. and Nov., but were up for July and Sept. and increased significantly for Dec. We finished the year with a deficit of \$31,331.97, but it was much better than the planned budget deficit of \$54,932. This was primarily due to the addition of a new renter, Kings Chapel, starting in April, which added an additional \$37,035 in rental income for the year. Income for the year was \$664,528.90 and expenses were \$695,860.87. Expenses were 0.5% higher than what had been originally budgeted due to increased utility rates and switching to a new custodial service. We added \$7,800 to the general fund reserve for the sale of the church van.

Messiah's Community Assistance income for 2023 (Side Aisle Giving) was \$12,648.31, 1% higher than anticipated. The Community Assistance fund supports Messiah's Community Meal, Wednesday Food Bank, Faith Action Network and Community Benevolence programs. We are thankful to the congregation for making a contribution to Messiah's Community Assistance fund along with their regular giving to Messiah. With the addition of the new renter, Kings Chapel, Messiah's Building Rental income for 2023 was \$96,549.50.

To help Messiah maintain a regular cash flow throughout the year, the Finance Committee recommends automatic giving using Thrivent "Simply Giving", "Recurring Giving" through your own bank, or VANCO "Online Giving". We suggest using Thrivent "Simply Giving" or "Recurring Giving" through your own bank because it saves Messiah the fees that VANCO charges to process payments. Those who are not participating in an automatic giving program are encouraged to do so. To learn about the various options for giving to Messiah, go to Messiah's website mlcauburn.org and click on the "Make an Offering" link. Remember to update your automatic giving for any contribution changes that are planned for 2024.

The Finance Committee met monthly in 2023 along with the Treasurer (Jonathan Baunach) to analyze financial reports, monitor income and expenses and strategize how best to utilize our financial resources to serve the ministries of Messiah.

In the fall, the Finance Committee together with the Executive Committee kicked off Messiah's 2024 stewardship drive, "That all may flourish". We received a combination of 107 Statements of Intent and/or "Simply Giving"/"Recurring Giving" automatic giving pledges from our members, pledging \$469,253 for Messiah for 2024. Thank you so much for those of you who were able to participate in our stewardship drive this year for your continued financial support to Messiah.

One of the primary tasks of the Finance Committee is to develop a budget each year. The "draft" budget that we have developed for 2024 currently has a total income of \$666,030 and total expenses of \$732,088 which results in a deficit of \$66,058. The Executive Committee along with Messiah staff are

actively reviewing the "draft" budget to come up with ways to reduce this deficit both by generating more income and cutting expenses. Covering this deficit will likely require additional funding from the congregation along with using some of Messiah's general fund reserve. The final 2024 budget will be sent to the church council for review and will be presented to the congregation for approval at the annual meeting on Feb. 4, 2024. A narrative of the budget follows:

Income: General undesignated income was calculated from statements of intent and/or automatic giving received during our stewardship campaign. For those who did not pledge, a forecast based on 2023 actual giving was made. This identified giving income is projected to decrease by \$11,784 for 2024, a 2% decrease from 2023. Other incomes (rental, special offerings, community assistance, etc.) were estimated at 2023 actual values and adjusted as needed. Rental income is projected to increase by \$14,991 for 2024, a 16% increase from 2023.

<u>Expenses:</u> The budget is grouped in areas of Messiah's ministries reflecting the Messiah Mission and Vision statements. Within these areas are specific line items. The Finance Committee used 2023 actual expenses as the basis for many of the 2024 budget expenses and adjusted as needed. Staff compensation updates will be reviewed by the Executive Committee and the church council. Property expenses were increased by 19% due to the increased cost of utilities for 2024. Budget variances will be reviewed by the Finance and Executive Committees each month.

<u>Summary</u>: Messiah's income is largely contingent on the congregation fulfilling statement of intent commitments. An exhaustive analysis is being made to ascertain income projections and to cut expenses. We are hopeful for the congregation's continued generosity and financial support for 2024.

Messiah Lutheran Church Endowment Fund Committee Report for 2023 Messiah Endowing Today for Tomorrow

Your Endowment fund 2023 beginning balance was \$604,227. The 2023 ending balance including interest, dividends and distributions was \$688,387. The return on investment for the year was 11.3%.

Donations to the MLC Endowment Fund from its inception in 1993 through 2023 year-end total \$341,530. During that same time, the Endowment Fund has distributed over \$232,066. The MLC Endowment funds are invested in six Vanguard funds, and a Business Checking Account at Umpqua Bank.

In order to sustain the endowment fund 'forever' per MLC bylaws, the committee can distribute between 3 and 6% of a rolling 5-year average of the annual value of the endowment fund. The committee establishes each year's distribution % at the beginning of the calendar year. The committee considers inflation, dividend growth and yearly performance of the funds when establishing the funds available for distribution. For 2023, the distribution rate was set at 4% for a value of \$24,977. Of the \$24,977 available, \$15,396 was distributed.

The Endowment Committee approved nine distributions in 2023. Two seminary scholarships and seven missions of Messiah Lutheran. One recipient of a seminary scholarship was Hannah Johnsrud, currently in her third year at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. The other seminary recipient was Andrew Larsen who was recently ordained as a Minister of Word and Service in the ELCA.

Donations to the Endowment Fund are a great way to support both current and future generations. There are several ways to donate. Cash/check, stock shares donation, charitable trust transfers, and planned giving to name a few. Please contact the Church office to be put in contact with a committee member that can assist.

Forms are available in the church office and on the church website to apply for Endowment funds.

Worship, Finance and Operations Manager Annual Report 2023

Happy New Year Messiah Members and friends! This year has been full of learning new tasks, enjoying a busy and full building and celebrating God through worship and prayer.

The building is a busy place. You can read more about our building in the Building Maintenance Report.



Pastor Bridget's Annual Report - 2023

Last year at the Extravaganza – a conference for volunteers, staff, and ministers working with children, youth, and family – I attended a class on how to minister to Gen Z. In that class the instructors talked about the three big questions youth are asking right now, which are: "Who am I?" "Where do I belong?" and "What difference can I make?" These might be questions that you asked yourself when you were in middle or high school; they may even be questions you are asking yourself now!

The church has a huge role to play in helping youth (and people of all ages) answer these questions. Alone, many youth believe they are not enough or only worth their follower count, that they only belong where they can make themselves fit in, and that their purpose is to choose a good career and follow it forever. But as a congregation, we can help each of our young people know that they are a beloved child of God, that they belong with God's people, and they are invited into God's greater story.

Faith formation continues to evolve and grow as we shift from a model that is primarily knowledge based to one that centers relationships with God, with one another, with the congregation, and with the community. We still have programs geared to different ages that present Bible stories in age-appropriate ways. Faith Foundations is for K-6 and gives kids building blocks of Bible stories and illustrating activities. Faith in Action starts in 7th grade and works with students to grow in faith, discern what God is doing in the world, and to join in. This year they are also joining up with the high school group as they prepare to travel to the Youth Gathering in New Orleans by learning how they were created to be brave, authentic, free, disruptive, and disciples. We still celebrated our graduating seniors, took a group to Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp, and proudly watched two youth affirm their baptisms.







And this past year we also adapted programming to help youth answer those three big questions. We began sending out postcards to help each student celebrate their baptismal birthday. We joined other area ELCA congregations for a middle and high school retreat last winter, for a Young Adult VBS over the summer, and for an elementary school retreat this fall. We added more places in Faith in Action lessons to talk to members of the congregation and participate in worship leadership. We made Vacation Bible School cross-generational and used curriculum from ELCA World Hunger to highlight the work we do through the wider church. We added Mission Sunday lessons, discernment, and planning into Faith in Action every month.







Thank you for helping our youth know that they are beloved children of God, that they belong here with us at Messiah, and that they are invited into God's greater story! Thank you for supporting Mission Sunday, for engaging with youth in the Gathering Space as they complete scavenger hunts, for gleefully taking part in cross-generational activities, for teaching, chaperoning, or supervising, for buying butterbraids and coffee and donating to the Youth Gathering, for praying for our children, youth, and families, and most of all, for showing God's love to all our students! I could not do faith formation alone, and I deeply appreciate the ways you are living out the promises you made to all our kids at their baptisms. If you would like to have an even greater role in this amazing, transformational, and joyful work, don't hesitate to let me know!







Pastorally, this was a great year, and I continue to love getting to know Messiah and the city of Auburn better and better! I was able to baptize several children, including my new niece, Runa! I marched in my first Pride parade with others from Messiah. I spent 10 weeks this fall participating in Auburn's Civics Academy and learned so much about this city's history, resources, challenges, and joys, along with meeting many others who love living in Auburn. I also was able to get to know others in the Synod better, through the Bishop's Convocation, hosting the Synod gathering, going to cluster meetings in Enumclaw, and attending a couple ordinations. Finally, I started our first of hopefully many opportunities to volunteer with Arcadia House. It has been a joy to see God at work with and among us, and I can't wait to see how we will experience God's love and pass it to others in the year to come.
